IED welcomes new Director, Mr. Alvin Dizon



COLLEGE READINESS WORKSHOP HELD IN OCTOBER 2021

Indian Education Department (IED) hosted its yearly College Readiness Educational Workshop (CREW) in October 2021. This informative interactive workshop provided three educators an opportunity to help motivate and educate students about college readiness.

Ms. Yoshabel Shay, a counselor from Las Vegas High School, coached students on how to fill out a college application and the Free Application for Federal Assistant (FAFSA). Dr. Shawna Begay, recruiter for Grand Canyon University, presented all the different programs offered by the university. There were discussions about the how to retain American Indian/Alaska Native students in college and how to maintain good grades in college. Ms. Della Frank, Indian Education Department Coordinator, presented on tribal colleges and universities as well as on tribal scholarships.

The workshop ended with an interactive game of Kahoots with questions from the three presentations. Hailey Smith, a student at Las Vegas Academy of the Arts, won the game with the top score. Student Eligibility for Title VI and Johnson O'Malley Programs

IED has a goal to increase the enrollment in the Title VI and the Johnson O'Malley (JOM) programs. We invite our enrolled members to help us get the word out to American Indian families you know who would benefit from the IED services. Currently, 660 students are enrolled in the Title VI program and 510 students are enrolled in the JOM program.

Title VI Formula Indian Grant

Descendant of a parent/grandparent with a Certificate of Indian Blood (CIB) card or letter from a federal or state recognized tribe. The following documents for Title VI eligibility are:

- Title VI 506 Form
- Eligible proof of descendancy for parents or grandparents or students.
- Certificate of Indian Blood or Letter from Tribal **Enrollment office**

Johnson O'Malley (JOM)

Student is an enrolled member with a Certificate of Indian Blood (CIB) card or letter of a federal or state recognized tribe. JOM students qualify for both Title VI and JOM. The following documents for JOM program eligibility are:

- Title VI Form
- Johnson O' Malley Form
- Tribal Certificate of Indian Blood or Tribal Letter(s) of blood quantum showing 1/4 percent.

Indian Education Department has been working with the organization Toys for Tots for over five years. Toys for Tots collects toys and donates them to schools or groups like Indian Education Department who help distribute the toys out to hundreds of American Indian/Alaska Native students.

The event is no small undertaking. Ms. Della Frank places an order in July for 100 plus toys. In early December, the toys arrive in Pahrump, Nevada. Mr. Frank Miller and his team will group the toys according to the order placed by different organizations. Once the toys are ready for pick up, Mrs. Frank will drive all the way to Pahrump to pick up the toys. With help from the Clark County Indian Education Committee and other volunteers the toys can be gift wrapped in two days.

An Eventbrite is sent out to the families to register their child by providing their gender

and their age. Then on December 18. Indian Education Department and the Clark County Indian Education Committee gave out over 150 toys. The event was a huge success. Thank you to all the volunteers that helped wrap gifts and distribute them to the families.
